
Love Languages



-US Withdrawal from Syria-

"Our boys, our young women, our men they're all coming back, and they're coming back now," President Donald Trump announced in December of 2018. This statement was made public through Twitter, and designed to tell the American public that the United States would be withdrawing all 2,000 American troops from Syria. His decision was largely brought about by his public desire to remove US troops from this particularly messy foreign conflict. So far, Trump has ordered that the action be completed within 30 days, though it has only recently begun. A jolting decision, it has brought about storms of protest and praise, both inside and outside America.

In order to fully understand the impacts and consequences of this decision, we need to go back to 2011 when the Syrian Civil War began. As this conflict is the direct cause of the convoluted situation in the Middle East, it tells us exactly why we got involved and who the Assad government is. It began when Bashar Hafez al-Assad gained power due to the death of his father and brother (who was next in line for the presidency). However, upon securing said power, Assad began to enforce neo-liberal and capitalist policies upon the people of Syria. When the people of Syria reacted badly, Assad turned towards mass suppression to enforce his rule. As discontent grew, the Arab Spring protests escalated into an armed conflict, forcing those in the region to react and certain world powers to take up sides.

The United States government claims we

entered Syria because the Assad government was using chemical weapons against civilians. However, the truth may lie much deeper than that. This point of unrest was a perfect time to weaken the Syrian government, a long-standing goal of the US. By keeping Syria weak and divided, we are able to maintain a steady hand in that region and don't have to worry about the Assad government gaining enough power to be a formidable enemy.

This may be why Trump's many military advisors warn against the pull-out, in fact, many warn that leaving the conflict will have drastic consequences. To make matters worse, both the Pentagon and the White House have yet to give clarification on how the withdrawal will proceed. Our biggest fear, however, seems to be based upon strategic losses. Both Russia and Iran will rise to exert a large amount of influence, something our national security policy warns against. In a letter to the American public, Senators Lindsey Graham, Joni Ernst, Marco Rubio, and Jeanne Shaheen state that Trump's decision is a "premature and costly mistake that not only threatens the safety and security of the United States, but also emboldens ISIS, Bashar al-Assad, Iran and Russia." This means that once we leave, these countries are most likely going to retake the area, and ISIS may regain the power it previously lost. This means a solid defeat to the American cause within Syria.

By leaving the area we will also abandon our loyal ally, Syria's ethnic Kurds, who



tions, emotions, and many other things. The amount of sleep that the body gets is an excellent indicator of overall health. It is critical that the body gets food and water, but the body also needs a healthy amount of resting.

At every age, there is a certain recommended amount of sleep. From birth to about eleven or twelve, the human body demands more of it. On average that is about 11 to 14 hours a night. However, as you grow older, your body requires less and less sleep. If you oversleep, the body will feel more tired and it could also lead to depression. Throughout middle school and high school, you need 8 to 9 hours a day. As an athlete, you need more sleep to help your body recover. As a highschooler, I know it can be tough to get the right amount of sleep with morning practice, jobs, homework, the early school start, and stress. One of the ways you can counter this is by "power sleeping" on the weekend, where you get extra sleep either by sleeping in an hour, or by taking a nap.

There are four main benefits to getting a healthy amount of sleep. Firstly, sleep improves brain function. This includes being able to efficiently learn, retain information, and have better social interactions. When you don't get enough sleep, you have slower cognition, lower social processing, memory problems, and difficulty concentrating. Secondly, sleep improves physical health. It helps to regulate blood sugar levels, keep your immune system functioning, improves the health of the heart, decreases stress, and keeps your productivity high. With the appropriate amount of sleep, your reaction time improves, which makes it much easier to prevent mistakes in any task. The third benefit of sleeping is regulating your weight. When the human body is sleep deprived, our appetite hormones change. Levels of leptin, the hormone that lets your stomach know when you've eaten enough, drop. In addition to that, the levels of ghrelin, the hormone that causes appetite, increase. Lastly, sleep improves skin quality. "When you get into stage three or four of sleep [deep sleep] your body makes human growth hormone, which is often referred to as the body's natural anti-aging hormone," says Cheryl Myers, a natural beauty expert. So, when someone says that they need to get their beauty sleep, they technically aren't wrong.

Most of us know that getting a good night's rest is

a superstar. She commanded the big screen throughout the 1940s, a celebrated sex symbol and every man's dream. She was such a star that Hollywood paid her around \$300,000 annually (that would be \$4.2 million today), making her America's highest-paid woman in 1946 and 1947. Besides being a box office champ, it was largely her legs that won her this money and fame. Perfectly chiseled, they were insured for one million US dollars, a fortune at the time. After she finished her newest movie, Sweet Rosie O'Grady, in 1943, FOX Studios chose to capitalize off her wonderful legs by commissioning their chief portrait and still photographer, Frank Powolny, to do a bathing suit photoshoot with Betty. The idea was to gain media attention by accentuating her best asset, and in conse-



quence, gain publicity for her new movie as well. Though Frank was no "spring chicken" when it came to portrait photography, this particular session didn't go well at the start. He was looking to achieve something new, and it just wasn't going the way he envisioned. After many disappointing shots, it finally happened. Frank requested Betty turn her back to the camera,

and she obliged. "How about this?" Betty questioned, turning her face towards the camera. It was then that Frank snapped two photos, the second of which became famous.

Upon its release, FOX Studios saw its potential. They went straight to the US military and persuaded them to allow five million postcards of the photo to be distributed among American soldiers fighting in WWII. After this, the photo exploded into popularity, becoming the most requested picture in movie history. Maybe it was her figure, maybe it was the idea that she was the ideal "back home gal", but whatever it was it was a hell of a motivator. War bond sales soon exploded skyward. It was painted on planes, bomber jackets, and barrack walls. Soldiers even kept copies of the photo on them at all time for good luck. But why was it

Wolves are known for their bravery, beauty, and as the proud ancestors of the modern dog. However, some take the love of wolves to a new extreme with poaching. Some wolves are also killed because they sometimes hunt livestock. Although, it's our own fault they turn to such eating habits as we humans have reaped their dens and hunting ranges for hundreds of years now. They only have 2/3 of the land they used to have worldwide and 10% in North America.

In North America, wolves almost became nonexistent because of an eradication policy designed to protect livestock. In 1926, wolves in Yellowstone were killed off. Life became a little easier for some farmers, but local animals suffered. Without the wolves to hunt the elk, their population exploded. The elk ate young trees and tons of vegetation that other herbivores depended on, which decreased their numbers. Coyotes and other scavengers had less to eat, which resulted in hungry coyotes and would sometimes drive them towards cities; which put young children and pets in danger. Beavers also needed many of the young trees, that the elk feasted on, to build dams. Without beaver dams, the literal structure of the landscape changed. Once wolves were reintroduced to Yellowstone in 1995, the elk population declined and the ecosystem balanced out. The beavers built dams, other herbivores had more vegetation to feed on, the foxes and coyotes had their natural prey back, and wolves proved that they are a vital part of certain habitats, especially ones that contain elk.

It is believed by some of the public

that wolves are overpopulated and must be hunted to keep their numbers in check. Wolf Conservation Center explains, "The idea that state-sanctioned killing of wolves is necessary to control wolf populations is one of the most widespread assumptions in large carnivore management. However, research demonstrates that wolves limit their own numbers. As apex predators, wolves keep their own numbers in check. Self-regulation in large carnivores like wolves ensures that the largest and the fiercest do not overexploit their resources. According to a recent work published in OIKOS, population control is what distinguishes wolves and other "apex predators" from the rest." The overall population of wolves worldwide has been quite steady lately, except for Red Wolves and Mexican Wolves. There is an estimated 30 Red Wolves living in the wild, and they are currently found only in North Carolina. 40 Red Wolves live in captivity or are used for experimental population and study. There are about 113 wild Mexican Wolves left, making them, and the Red Wolves, one of the most endangered mammals in North America. They are both part of the endangered species list. Because the wolf population is on the rise, some may think that it's okay to start hunting again. But if we hunt them to near extinction, the consequences could be disastrous.

The mistreatment of these wild wonders that some call "beasts" is astonishing. With the numbers steady for most common wolves, they have a chance of staying on our planet for a while longer, which is much more than can be said for tigers. The future for Red and Mexi-

> can wolves however is looking bleak. Wolves are vital to certain ecosystems and shouldn't be wiped out. You can help though; by reading this and making others aware of the wolves' current situation, you can help change the negative perception surrounding them and help others realize what a valuable and necessary contribution they make to our natural environment.





Side effects include: increased cancer risk, nausea, vomiting, skin burns, cataracts, changes to the bone, muscle, and cartilage microarchitecture as well as anxiety, fatigue, damage to the hippocampus, and many others. Oh, and if exposure is long enough, death. NASA has addressed these problems by stating, "It is unlikely that the radiation risk problem for space exploration will be solved by a simple countermeasure, such as shielding or radio protective drugs."

NASA has taken the lead in U.S. space exploration, but now Elon Musk's SpaceX is making its way to the top. SpaceX is a private company founded in 2002 by Elon Musk. Their goal is to advance space technology to enable humans to live on other planets. Since Mars is the closest habitable planet, that's their target. SpaceX announced on their online webpage that, "Our aspirational goal is to is to send our first cargo missions to Mars in 2022. The objectives for the first mission will be to confirm water resources, identify hazards, and put in place initial power, mining, and life support infrastructure. A second mission, with both cargo and crew, is targeted for 2024..." SpaceX is currently support-

crucial, but we neglect it. The main reason for this is that people stay up on their devices. According to The Statistics Portal, about 63% of people in the United States own a mobile phone, 87% have a computer or tablet, and 80% have at least one social media account. A solution to this is to completely turn off your device; this will reduce the temptation to check it. The next reason that people aren't getting enough sleep is stress, and that can be caused by homework, tests, problems at home, or whatever keeps you up and tossing and turning. Sometimes the stress is so much that you are so focused on falling asleep that you can't "turn off" your brain to sleep. There are many ways to help decrease stress and fall asleep. To help fall asleep you can drink some tea that doesn't have caffeine, take a bath, read a book, use the "4-7-8" breathing method, practice meditation or yoga, or listen to relaxing music. One that most people don't know about is watching what time you eat and what you eat. Try to eat at least two hours before going to bed, and stay away from heavy meals. This gives your body nutrients and makes you feel better before falling asleep. Another reason people don't get enough sleep is having too much caffeine or sleeping medications. If this is the reason you aren't falling asleep at a healthy time, cut back the intake of these types of substances.

There are many natural elements that can affect your sleeping. The most common sleep disorder is insomnia. Typically, insomnia involves having trouble falling asleep, staying asleep, and trouble waking up early. Some symptoms of insomnia are depression, lack of energy, change in mood, and behavior disturbances. Some causes for insomnia are medical, psychiatric, stress, and worry. About 10% of all Americans suffer from insomnia, some without even knowing it. Another sleep disorder is sleep apnea, which is when a person's breathing stops for an extended period of time while sleeping due to a blockage in the upper respiratory system. This is because the throat tissue collapses in, blocking airflow. About 20 million people suffer from this in America alone.

Sleep is necessary for survival. If you struggle with getting enough sleep, try out some of the previous methods. Sleep is very important, and if you do not get enough, it affects you and the people around you. To get the most out of your everyday life, get a healthy amount of rest at night.

Though most florists take out a rose's thorns; they represent a sense of defense, against loss and thoughtlessness. Now, that may seem like a strange opposing theory, and make someone wonder why we would give these to the ones we hold dear. Maybe that's the beauty it's trying to portray; nothing is perfect. Love is about overcoming hardships because it can bring you closer as a couple and respect each other as individuals. The thorns help to represent a defense against the hardships that can tear two apart.

The color of the rose itself changes the meaning, and may even change the demeanor of the gift as well. Every rose shows a sense of love, but not the same type. The red rose is the most popular Valentine rose. A single red rose can simply express "I love you very deeply" and this is the most obvious expression of the rose that we know. In the 18th century, a rose language was created as a language between two lovers who were forced by society to keep their feelings a secret. Another facet of the red rose is desire; it is to be passionate and gives a sense of love that will last the test of time. As represented in The War of The Rose, they also express courage, and power. Historically, the

red rose is what Cleopatra used to carpet her bedroom; they conveyed a sense of warmth and protection.

While other roses are quite beautiful, white roses have a special significance. They bring the most significance of innocence and purity, they're also known as the bridal rose. The white rose took a huge leap in popularity during the Victorian Era, where suitors would send a bouquet of white roses to a woman as a token of their love. Queen Victoria was actually one of the first to use white roses in her wedding. In ancient times, the white rose was believed to be associated with the goddess of love, Aphrodite. The myth tells that she pricked her finger on a white rose and turned them all red. White roses even hit history and are linked to the Virgin Mary as she was referred to as the Mystical Rose of Heaven. Even today, white roses are still the most common flower to be seen down the aisle.

Pink roses have a heavy significance of love and gratitude; they carry undertones of elegance and grace. They are also known as the island rose because they were the only rose allowed to bloom in Jerusalem. Jerusalem's name comes from the Hebrew word "shalem" which is now "shalom" which means peace, thus giving the pink rose a serene image. The pink rose used to be the most dominant species of wild rose. In the 18th century they were first cultured commercially and the color range was between a pale, almost white, to a deep crimson red. U.S. & Syria

have been committed allies in fighting the Islamic State. For years Turkey has been trying to steal away the Kurd's cultural identity, referring to them as "mountain Turks who lost their language." Because of this, the Kurds have long sought to create their own independent state, and the war in Syria has recently allowed them to do so. They carved out their own space in Syria, and we, the United States, promised them that it would be theirs. This frightens Turkey, who believes that an independent Kurdistan will threaten Turkey's territorial integrity, compelling their desire to decimate the Kurds before they grow too powerful. In addition, without the US to assist the Kurds, the Assad government is apt to attempt to take back the territory it lost, most likely with the help of Turkey and Russia. By pulling out, we effectively leave the Kurds vulnerable to attack from all sides as Turkey, Russia, ISIS, and the Assad government will most likely decimate their population and drive them from Syria. By abandoning them, we will also cripple our efforts to gain local fighter groups as allies in the future. However, Trump has warned Turkey that an attack on the Kurds will have dire consequences.

There are always two sides to a story. America is a strong country. By pulling our troops from the ground, we aren't abandoning our efforts in Syria.

American ambassador Robert Ford even says that our limited ground presence would not have been enough to fulfill all our goals. He states that we can accomplish the same things we were accomplishing before by conducting airstrikes instead. As a Yale graduate and a member of the Middle East Institute, he believes that the fight in Syria should be predominantly between Syrians. In addition, the pull-out will also improve our relationship with Russia. Since the Cold War, Russia has had a strong political bond with Syria, and our fight against the Assad government has weakened our governmental ties with Russia. Conflicts between our forces and Russian forces on Syrian turf have also caused tensions between the two countries. By leaving, we will allow Russia and Turkey to conduct a Syrian Constitutional Committee, which may bring about a resemblance of peace to Syria and consequently improve our relationship with the Russian Federation.

In conclusion, our limited influence in Syria will have consequences, whether they be good or bad. With the United States involved, peace within Syria is not possible. By withdrawing our troops, however, a ceasefire may now have a chance, slim as it is. Our relationship with Russia will be less strained, but if Turkey attacks the Kurds our relationship with the Turkish government could suffer. If attacked, the Kurds most likely will be killed in droves and treated as traitors, all the while being forced into cultural genocide. Finally, the pull-out may cause history to repeat

itself. In 2011, when President Barack Obama withdrew American troops from Iraq it allowed for ISIS to rise to power, causing the US to return to the region shortly after. By leaving, we may just allow a bigger problem to grow. However, only time will tell what the true outcome will be. As of now, all we can do is cross our fingers and hope Trump knows what he's doing.

The Modern Maze




Escape rooms are a new type of thrilling activity that is spreading throughout the world, and people can't seem to get enough of them. The concept of an escape room is quite simple, yet it never ceases to entertain. You are "locked" in a room and have to interact with your environment to solve puzzles and escape. This sort of puzzle-game has been around a long time, dating back all the way to Greek mythology with the story of the Minotaur in the labyrinth. Throughout modern history, this type of entertainment has taken a lot of different forms. What once started as hedge mazes moved its way into corn mazes and has recently taken the thrilling form of haunted corn mazes. People are constantly seeking more interaction and excitement, and I believe that this is the next link in its "evolutionary chain," so to speak. To understand how escape rooms have developed into the booming industry that it is today, we are going all the way back to the original fan base: the gamers.

In 1988, John Wilson created a game called, "Behind Closed Doors." It was a text-based adventure that had players enter text commands to escape a restroom. It was one of the first "escape games" ever created and due to its success it launched a completely new genre of gaming that was popular among early gamers. Many game companies quickly caught on to the growing trend and most of them found a decent amount of success, how-

By 2005, hundreds of millions of people had downloaded the game, and the numbers kept growing. People wanted thrilling adventures that they could feel a part of, and Takagi gave them exactly that. Gamers felt like they were actually in the simulation of being locked in a room and navigating their way to safety. It was from this wildly popular game that the birth of physical escape rooms would come.

In 2007, a man by the name of Takao Kato would create the first ever "Real Escape Game." Kato felt inspired after watching a classmate play an online version of an escape room and he wanted to try to bring it to real life. He started out hosting small events in clubs and bars throughout Japan and he quickly found himself overwhelmed with customers. Realizing the potential that this sort of attraction had, Kato would go on to create Scrap Entertainment Inc. Japan was not the only place that escape rooms thrived. Scrap Entertainment began setting up escape rooms across the world starting with Singapore in 2011, then San Francisco in 2012. Today they have locations in multiple countries including Romania, Hungary, and Switzerland. Kato wouldn't be the only person to catch onto this trend. Dealing with the Devil?

Throughout musical-history there seems to be a popular trend of musicians making deals with the Devil. Robert Johnson is by far the most widely recognized example of this, as many believe Johnson sold his soul to Lucifer in exchange for the Delta Blues. While Johnson may be the most popular example of soul-dealing, he is not the first. The first person to make a claim was Giuseppe Tartini, composer of the "Devil's Trill Sonata". Upon examination of Tartini and his encounter with the Devil, the very root of this phenomenon is clear.

Giuseppe Tartini's story begins during the early 18th century in the beautiful town of Ancona, Italy. Tartini was a youthful aristocrat, a dreamer and a philosopher, but not a musician. In fact, Tartini had never even held an instrument for the first 16 years of his life. However, that all changed when Tartini witnessed the violinist Francesco Maria Veracini perform. While Tartini was not familiar with the violin, he was determined to master it in hopes of playing as beautifully as Francesco. To achieve this, Tartini plunged himself into isolation for nearly 500 days with nothing but a violin and the determination to succeed. Tartini emerged a new man with the wondrous Devil's Trill Sonata, a captivating, intriguing, and above all else, a beautiful piece of music. The song carried Tartini into the limelight of many theatres and is still revered by violinists as one of the most infamously difficult scores to play.

Later in the 18th century,

when Tartini was nearing the end of his life, he confided in a long time friend of his, the astronomer Jerome Lalande, the truth behind his Devil's Trill Sonata. night, in the year 1713 I dreamed I had made a pact with the devil for my soul. Everything went as I wished. My new Servant anticipated my every desire. Among other things, I gave him my violin to see if he could play. How great was my astonishment on hearing a sonata so wonderful and beautiful, played with such great art and intelligence, as I had never conceived in my broadest flights of fantasy... I awoke immediately [and] grasped my violin in order to retain, in part at least, the impression of my dream." Tartini died the following day after his confession.

While the verity of Tartini's statement is still hotly debated, many consider Tartini's dream to be attributed to his isolation. When the brain is in plunged into prolonged periods of isolation it will produce internal stimuli which triggers emotional, and often vivid hallucinations, to stimulate a sense of contact with someone or something beyond you. This form of psychosis is often found in individuals who have been stranded or lost for a period of a year or longer. However, Tartini did receive food and other necessities on an almost daily basis, so this explanation holds little ground. Another argument is that this vision was a cause of sleep paralysis, as Tartini mentions that the Devil visited him in a dream. While this is possible, it's unlikely, as sleep paralysis is a sensational

If you are in a cozy mood and want to curl up with a blanket while hiding away from the cold, these quick and easy cookies are the perfect thing for you! With a crispy, flaky exterior, and a gooey caramel filling, these cookies are perfect for a night where you just want to take it easy with a cup of hot chocolate.

Ingredients:

- 2 Pillsbury pie crusts
 - 12 soft caramel candies
- ¼ cup butter (unsalted, melted)
- 1 cup sugar
 - 1 tablespoon ground cinnamon

Directions:

First, preheat your oven to 400 degrees F and line two baking sheets with parchment paper. Set aside, and roll out each pie crust and use a small circle cookie cutter to make 24 circles. You may reuse the crust by combining all end pieces, and rolling it out again if necessary. Once you have all 24 circles, grab one, place a caramel candy in the middle, and brush the edges with water. Next, place another circle of pie crust on top of that and press the edges with a fork to seal the two pieces together. Once sealed, repeat 11 more times, and place 6 cookies on each of your two lined baking sheets. Then, bake each sheet one at a time for 8-10 minutes, or until the edges are golden brown. While the cookies are baking, grab a medium sized bowl, and in that mix together your sugar and cinnamon. Set this aside until the cookies are done. Once the cookies are fully baked, allow them to cool until warm on the baking sheet. Once the cookies are cooled enough, brush with melted butter, and roll in the bowl of sugar and cinnamon. Lightly shake off any excess, and enjoy!



hallucination triggered to awake the senses by visualizing a tangible threat, not a more or less helpful entity. The answer to this historical debate may very well lie in the music itself.

In the Devil's Trill Sonata, Tartini utilizes a type of note called a tritone. A tritone is performed by playing three parallel notes in unison to produce a sound that is truly unique. The tone is unnatural to the human ear, yet captivating at the same time. The note was considered unholy and taboo to play during the medieval ages of Europe, as it was thought to be a note of evil, hence its true name Diabolus Musica. Tartini's command of these tritones not only captures the audience, but also adds a truly unique ambience to the theatre. After Tartini's use of tritones many musicians soon began to dabble in the form, resulting in a new age of classical music spearheaded by musical giants such as Camille Saint-Saëns. Looking at the structure of the score and the heavy use of tritones, it's very obvious the intent of the song was to capture the audience. Centuries later, this very type of stylistic approach was implemented by rock-n-roll bands such as AC/DC and Led Zeppelin. The common theme these musicians hold, although separated by centuries, is the aesthetic in which the songs are presented.

Some might say that the similarities only further prove that the Devil was involved; however, that is not the case. The fact that these musicians have done so well in the musical business is due to the image that they're selling to the people. Tartini sold a Devil's Trill Sonata to an audience of eager Italian romantics while AC/DC sold A Highway to Hell to a generation of rockaholics. What we can glean from these two musical masterminds, centuries apart from each other, is this: marketing matters. Perhaps Tartini knew that, and spread a rumor of soul-swapping before he passed away so his legacy would outlive him for a millennium to come.

Health Benefits of Chocolate

Multiple studies have shown many different health benefits that come with the consumption of dark chocolate. Sadly, milk chocolate is left out of the equation because of its high sugar and low cocoa content. However, dark chocolate gives your brain an increased release of hormones, is much better for you, and makes you feel good about yourself for choosing a healthier snack. Even more, your body will be thanking you for choosing such a guilt-free Valentines treat!

What makes this food so super? Its nutrition label will tell us. As we go higher in cocoa content, you begin to see that dark chocolate is loaded with nutrients such as fiber, iron, magnesium, copper, manganese, potassium, phosphorus, and zinc. With all this enrichment there are bound to be health benefits, as our body uses these minerals to function. In addition, since dark chocolate is made from the seed of the cocoa tree, it is one of the best sources of antioxidants on the planet. In fact, studies show that this "superfood" contained more antioxidants (such as polyphenols, flavanols, and catechins) than any other tested fruits. These compounds work to make our heart healthy and lower our risk of infections and cancer. However, the benefits go even further.

As mentioned above, dark chocolate may be part of the recipe for a healthy heart. It's shown that consumption of cocoa powder can lead to a significant decrease in oxidized LDL (low-density lipoproteins) cholesterol in men. This is important because LDL can lead to a build-up of "bad" cholesterol in your arteries. In addition, this same study showed that chocolate led to a build-up of HDL (high-density lipoproteins) which are considered the good kind of cholesterol, as they protect you from the buildup of LDL. This is because the antioxi-

dants in cocoa that enter your bloodstream protect you against oxidative damage. In addition, dark chocolate also reduces insulin resistance, which is commonly connected to heart disease.

Another big benefit that comes with this remarkable treat is better, lower, blood pressure. The flavanols in dark chocolate stimulate the lining of our arteries into producing nitric oxide. Once it is produced, nitric oxide sends signals to the arteries, telling them to relax. This allows blood to flow easier, therefore reducing blood pressure. Many controlled studies have produced these same results, proving that chocolate is positive for our circulation. However, the effects tend to be mild, but something is better than nothing, so why not enjoy yourself while being good to your body?

In addition, this tasty treat is also connected to better cognitive function, i.e., it prevents memory loss. Italian researchers found that the flavanols in cocoa positively affect the circulation of blood in the brain and boost the speed of processing visual imagery. Since different areas need more energy to complete tasks, they also need the improved blood flow chocolate can provide. This is especially important for older adults, as research suggests, because they already are at risk of cognitive decline. Scientists at Harvard Medical School found that hot chocolate supported brain function in the elderly, and a 2014 lab study showed that cocoa extract can reduce or prevent damage to neurological pathways connected to Alzheimer's. As the Italian research team says, "Dark chocolate is a rich source of flavanols. So we always eat some dark chocolate. Every day."

All in all, let's not only celebrate love, but also celebrate our bodies this Valentine's Day. Cocoa is good for your blood pressure, brain, and heart, so your body will be celebrating you right back. Give some dark chocolate to your parents, siblings, friends, and most importantly your lover. Maybe even save some for yourself because, before you give your heart away, it pays to make sure it's healthy.

In 2014, there were around 22 locations in America; today there are over 2,300 locations with the numbers continuing to grow. Throughout the course of human history, few events reach the level of atrocity as the Holocaust. However, in the 20th century during the First World War, the systematic extermination of the Armenians by the Ottoman Turks is another example of unadulterated human cruelty. The Armenian Genocide began in 1915 and resulted in the death of over 1.5 million Armenian civilians. The genocide is often noted by historians as the Armenian Holocaust. However, there lies a key difference between the Jewish Holocaust and the Armenian Genocide. Germany was forced to recognize the Holocaust and its victims; Turkey has yet to do so.

In 1915 the First World War had already been underway for a year and the Ottoman Empire, modern day Turkey, was unstable. The Balkans, a previous part of the massive Ottoman Empire, sided with the Russians before the war's outbreak. Afraid the Armenians would side with the Russians as well, the Turkish Military mobilized against the Armenian people. As stated by Lt. Ahmed Moukhtar Baas, "In April of 1915 I was quartered at Erzeroum. An order came from Constantinople that Armenians inhabiting frontier towns and village be deported to the village interior. It was said then that this was only Eventually, a precautionary measure." the Armenians were "deported" to what was supposed to be "safer ground". However, once again Lt. Ahmed reveals the truth, "In July an order came to deport... all the Armenians...Being a member of the Court Marshall I knew that deportations meant massacre." The massacre in Erzeroum echoed throughout all of the Ottoman Empire. These horrific mass murders were recorded in several eyewitness accounts by media journalists and ex-military officials.

The New York Times even reported that the roads along the Euphrates River Basin were "...strewn with the corpses of exile..." Whilst Lt. Hasan Maruf described the burning of an entire Armenian village in a report to the Cabinet of War. Other methods of extermination, such as drowning, starvation, free fall, and crucifixion were also carried out by the Turks.

After the Great War, newly formed Turkey came under Allied occupation. Many Armenians fled the country to other regions of the world, and the remaining population of Armenians who stayed were too frightened to confront the Turkish government for the atrocities. When Allied boots left Turkish soil, the genocide that occurred during World War I soon became taboo to discuss. Until recently, in Turkish textbooks the Armenians were portrayed as traitors at the time of World War I and the genocide was displayed as an act of necessity. Any and all attempts to call out the Turkish government and clarify the events were considered punishable by fine or even prison sentence until the late 1970s. Despite the universal recognition of the event by historical scholars and government officials around the world, the Turkish government refuses to recognize the events as genocide, even today. In fact, in 2015, the 100th year anniversary of the genocide, the Turkish government celebrated the Battle of Gallipoli, which was a Turkish victory. The Armenian population was insulted by this act, and the outrage only furthered public unrest.

The benefits of acknowledgement are numerous. For example, Germany under the Third Reich was also responsible for the systematic extermination of the Jewish/ Polish population through the Holocaust. After World War II, Allied troops occupied

Over the last decade, we have seen a rise in the discontent of teachers; this has led to multiple walkouts and strikes across the nation. Red for Ed is the hash tag for a teacher-led movement to increase funding and support for public school education. Many of the teachers that take action wear red to represent solidarity. Persistent underfunding, large class sizes, insufficient school supplies and support staff (including, nurses, librarians, and counselors), compounded by diversion of public funds to private charter schools, are all reasons that have forced teachers out of the classroom and into the streets.


Following in the footsteps of West Virginia and Oklahoma, the most recent strikes in Los Angeles saw teachers and school support staff argue for a public spending cap on charter schools and the creation of a governor's committee to limit publicly funded charter schools. The teachers argued that privately backed charter schools were concentrated in wealthy areas, taking up much of the district's money and resources, and negatively impacting standard public schools.

In Washington State in September of last year, teachers for more than 11 percent of the state's school children went on strike and caused the school district to delay the start of school. Most school districts

quietly delivered double digit pay increases to the teachers. In Woodland Public Schools, teachers bargained for a 22.82 percent increase in base salary. The Los Angeles Teachers Union managed to secure a 6 percent raise in pay and a gradual decrease in class sizes over the next few years. They were also promised more counselors, librarians, and nurses.

But this movement is about more than teacher pay. Many teachers have to rely on their own money to have adequate materials and supplies for their classes. Due to the lack of supplies and overcrowded classrooms, students are suffering the consequences. These teachers are going on strike for a bigger cause, to secure adequate financial support to deliver quality education for all their students and for all students to have equal opportunity to learn.

In Oregon, teacher pay is above average and recent improvements are helping to reduce class sizes. These changes did not occur without outspoken teachers and their supporters. Teaching is one of the most important jobs for the future of our nation. Real change starts from the bottom up; it is ordinary people, like our teachers and bus drivers, who have the courage to speak out and make their voices heard that make a difference in this world.

Protecting Our Future

From 43 in 2017, to 82 in 2018, school shootings have nearly doubled in the past year. With these horrific numbers on the rise the question must be asked, "What are we going to do to protect the future of our country?" Students are the future, but with the fear of their safety distracting them, their education will be incomplete. Teachers have always told me that being a student is my job. If this is the case, then I want to be able to feel safe in my work environment and not have to worry that my life may be at risk.

Making schools safer is a simple solution. Armed guards and metal detectors are the best method of securing a school. Between both the metal detectors and the armed guards, potential shooters would be quickly deterred because of the difficulty of entering the school. South Carolina recently estimated the cost of implementing metal detectors and guards at around \$98 million with a \$14 million upfront cost. Back in May of 2018, following the school shooting at Frederick Douglass High School, Fayette County Public Schools were installed with metal detectors. The base costs for installing these safety measures includes \$4,000-\$5,000 per metal detector. Funding the armed guards will inevitably raise the cost at about \$18 an hour per guard, but without the armed guards there would be no reason to install metal detectors. Funding can be easily taken care of by adding a tax or slightly increasing a tax and within a year the funding would be available.

A recent study showed that the average police response time to a shooting is about 18 minutes, while the average actual shooting time is around 12 minutes. With this average response time the police wouldn't even arrive until there was no longer a threat and the damage had been done. By funding armed guards for each school, the response time would be almost instantaneous and would decrease

the number of injuries and hopefully completely cut out the number of people killed.

In a recent article from the Sun Sentinel, writer Lisa Pane shared, "The massacre that killed 10 people at a high school in Texas last week was just the latest to happen in a small or suburban city. Of the 10 deadliest school shootings in the U.S., all but one took place in a town with fewer than 75,000 residents and the vast majority of them were in cities with fewer than 50,000 people." Living in a small town comes with its pressures. Everyone tends to know everyone and when something goes wrong most of the community knows by the following day. Within the first 21 weeks of 2018, there were already 23 recorded school shootings, and eleven of these occurred in cities with a population of less than 60,000.

From the beginning of 2009 to May 2018, there were a total of 288 shootings that took place on a school campus in the U.S. CNN compared the number of school shootings from six other countries, Canada, France, Germany, Japan, Italy, and the UK. The combined number of shootings from these six countries in the same time period was five, that's 57 times less in six countries than in America. These numbers are way out of control and since then schools have begun to increase security, but the issue still remains. Schools only increase hallway monitoring and security cameras, but have done nothing to prevent dangers from entering the school buildings. Without actual armed guards and metal detectors at entrances around the schools, potential threats can still easily become actual threats. The safety of students is important to everyone and providing a safe environment for all students should be a top priority for school boards and the government. The solution is easy, but without the support of the people, the number of school shootings will continue to increase.

This proposal was passed by the Senate in 1972 and by the ten year deadline had been ratified by 35 of the required 38 states, resulting in the constitutional amendment failing.

According to some facts in "Feminism: A Fight for More Rights", it is implied that men have less rights than women and this is somehow reflected in higher rates of suicide and homelessness. The facts, while interesting, have little to do with equal rights and more to do with social and economic disparities. While I certainly agree that we need to address the underlying issues that impact mental health, economic and social tragedies, they have nothing to do with legislative equality.

While making up 50% of the population, women currently hold less than 25% of all state wide and federal elective offices. You ask, "Why don't we have equal rights yet?" The answer is that we have yet to pass an equal rights amendment to the Constitution. A Need for Corporal Punishment

In 1989, the state of Oregon banned corporal punishment, the use of physical pain to punish students by spanking or paddling. In the late 20th century most states decided corporal punishment was obsolete, however, 19 states still use corporal punishment with parental consent. This still is not effective. Over the past decade, each year students become more disobedient due to lack of consequences for their actions. Ridding the school system of corporal punishment forced schools to lose their power to enforce, protect, and teach.

Students are at school for one reason, to learn, whether it be actual subjects, or social cues, they are meant learn. In our current learning environment there are a lot kids that are insubordinate, disrespectful, and a pain to control. Physical discipline is the only way to show authority and contain these students. Everyday I see students in my classes acting disrespectful and rude. face. Teachers have to be able to control their students. If we apply corporal punishment to kids in grade school, they will be more respectful throughout future schooling. This will also help them as adults because in life police officers can do what is necessary to restrain you.

Oregon gives the school the ability to physically restrain a student if they are making threats to their peers or themselves. This is a very vague law and most teachers try to stay away from these situations so they don't get in trouble. Anything between a student and teacher that involves physical contact is room for the teacher getting in trouble. Giving teachers the ability to defuse any problem with restraint should be allowed. But teachers should also be able to start earlier by enforcing punishment so students are less likely to get in those situations. The ability to control kids is becoming seemingly impossible.

Theresa May vs. Parliament

Brexit, short for British Exit from the European Union, is causing massive upheaval in the UK Parliament. With the current departure date set for March 29th of this year, the distress both Parliament and its civilians are experiencing is understandable. France has even given UK businesses temporary working visa to keep their business alive in the event of a "no-deal" scenario.

The term esports refers to any multiplayer video game that is played competitively. Since the early 1970s esports have not only grown a huge fan base, but it has thrived economically. In the 1970s the first known competition was held at Stanford University, where contestants played Spacewar. They competed for the grand prize of a year's subscription to the Rolling Stone magazine. Spacewar was developed in 1962 and involved two players controlling spaceships and trying to eliminate each other.

Leading other countries into the 1990s, South Korea quickly popularized esports with the mass building of the broadband internet. With the Asian financial crisis in 1997 causing high unemployment rates, it is thought that many people turned to video games while out of work. Internet cafes also known as "PC Bangs" quickly became a popular meeting place for South Koreans to play games. The South Korean government quickly backed these by creating the Korean e-Sports Association to promote and regulate esports within the country. Top gaming professionals in South Korea are common household names, and couples going to game clubs is about as common as couples going to the movies here in America.

Back in America with the increase in internet connectivity, computer games began to become more popular. At the top of the list was Netrek a multiplayer internet game involving real time combat and much like capture the flag. Tournaments continued to become more popular as video games continued to expand and be more interactive. Nintendo held their first ever world championship where they toured 30 cities throughout America. Each city hosted a three day tournament, and the first place winner was given a trophy, \$250, and a trip for two to the world finals.

With publicity becoming easier to obtain, national and global esport tournaments took off. From only about 10 large tournaments in 2000 to about 260 in 2010, some of which include the World Cyber Games, the Intel Extreme Masters, and Major League Gaming. With television becoming more common as well, esport were quick to take to the screens, broadcasting tournaments for all to see. Television coverage was best established in South Korea, with StarCraft and


Boys Basketball




