 They have webbed feet, too.


 They do not have wings,

- Penguins have special feathers that keep them dry.


Red areas show where penguins live.

- Rockhopper penguins live on chilly beaches in South America.



- Emperor penguins live in Antarctica, too.
- They are the biggest of all the penguins.
- Their big bodies can stay warm in the cold.
- Even junior Emperor penguins are larger than many other birds.

Other penguins live in warm places. Fairy penguins live in Australia.

They are the smallest penguins.

They have tiny bodies.

They are also called

Little Blue penguins.

- Find the penguins from this book on the chart.


